For those of us who live and work at Ser Chö Ösel Ling, 2015 ended with a deep sense of gratitude and with high hopes for the coming year. This past year brought to fruition a remarkable milestone for KCC, that of putting a dedicated cadre of practitioners into the traditional Kagyu threeyear, three-month retreat. While our primary responsibility is to support a container designed to allow the retreatants to settle into deep practice, the staff is also tasked with caring for SCOL's 240 acres, home to its human population but also to a wide, wondrous variety of plant and animal life. Those who have had the opportunity to visit know of our open skies and rolling hills, have seen blue birds and hawks, and perhaps heard a tale or two of the elk, badgers, and bobcats that move freely about.

While we enjoy the peace and beauty of our country setting, we are also aware that, like much of eastern Washington's landscape, our property is vulnerable to summer wildfires. Our warming planet and current drought cycle have created the conditions conducive for long hot fire seasons. It is with this in mind that we are partnering with the Washington Department of Natural Resources to participate in a fuel reduction "cost share" program.

The program was initiated by the State to inspire property owners to maintain healthy forests, to protect infrastructure and to support wildlife habitat. Creating healthy tree stands through thinning, removing low or dead branches, and spacing out the bitterbrush will reduce the fuel sources that provide avenues for fire to move horizontally and vertically. The State predetermines the financial cost of the reduction work and then reimburses the property owner for

half of that amount once the work is completed. This is why it is called a cost "share" program.

We are not the only property owner in our area to participate in the program. Our neighbors on our east boundary line have also signed up. As more and more land owners reduce fire hazards on individual properties, together we create an environment that is safer for all who call it home.



This is an ambitious project as we have committed to thinning, pruning, and burning slash in a fifteen-acre area. The final result will be a safer egress route along much of our main road. In order to accomplish this work within our two-year deadline, we will need help from community members. For people who like to work outdoors at tasks such as limbing trees, moving slash, and managing burn piles, please consider joining us for work parties in 2016. **Our first work gathering will be on February 13th.** Work parties are a great opportunity to spend a day in the country, among friends, and to feel a connection to the land and to our retreatants. A Cornucopia of Offerings in the New Year

The programs for 2016 will offer both continuity and new dimensions for study and practice at KCC. Last year we presented an overview of Buddhist practice from the perspective of the progression of Buddhist teachings in the "Three Turnings". While we will continue to use the Three Turnings as a basic frame of reference, this year the emphasis will be on exploring aspects of each of the Three Turnings in greater depth.

To start the year, Jeff and Sally Alworth will lead a class series on the five lay vows, one of the central elements of practice introduced in the first turning. This will be a special opportunity to explore the discipline of these precepts in the context of lay life.

Later, Zopa Herron will offer a series of Saturday classes on the Six Paramitas, which illuminate the core teachings and practices of wisdom and compassion in the second turning. If retreat venues can be arranged, we will also have two week-long retreats, one on Insight meditation and another on the practice of Chenrezig. These meditation retreats will be opportunities to engage in practices that embody the view of the third turning—the cultivation of recognition of our fundamental pure nature.

Many of this year's classes and programs will be led by people new to teaching at KCC. This may appear to be a matter of necessity, filling in for Lama Michael while he attends to the three year retreat. But it also reflects the fact that KCC is maturing as a spiritual community and we now have more individuals whose study and practice have deepened over the years and are now able to assist in ways that were not possible before.

These individuals reflect a variety of experiences with diverse backgrounds and personal paths. Sally and Jeff Alworth have been practicing at KCC since the mid-1990's after studying Buddhism at university. They have also been among the stalwarts keeping KCC alive and well, both serving as president of the Board of Directors.

Zopa Herron brings a different perspective informed by the experience of cloistered meditation practice on the One Year Retreat at SCOL and eight years of formal study and training while a resident at Shravasti Abbey.

Erik Fromme began the Mahamudra Program when Bokar Rinpoche came to Portland in 1996. He also brings a unique perspective from many years of work in palliative care where he has worked with both the outer and inner challenges that arise while assisting others. Erik will present a series of Sunday afternoon classes on the topic of death and dying in collaboration with Chozen Bays of Heart of Wisdom Zen Temple.

The diversity of the backgrounds and experiences of these individuals reflect the growing richness within our community, and we are very fortunate that they are willing to offer the community the benefit of their experience.

Along with these new programs, the ongoing Mind Training study group, the Young Adults Group and the quarterly gatherings for Milarepa Tsok continue under the able stewardship of Tim Campbell, Holly Hisamoto and Julie Hurlocker. For individuals who are ready, winter retreat will offer an opportunity to gain experience of personal retreat in a supportive environment. It is filling up quickly, so register soon!

Though there will not be a formal Mahamudra Seminar this year, there will be a new quarterly program to support those engaged in the program. We are also delighted to announce that this year in September Khenpo Lodro Donyo Rinpoche will offer the Yidam Seminar in Taiwan. This is an excellent opportunity for those who have been part of the Mahamudra Program and are interested in engaging in the Yidam practice associated with the program. As part of the maturing process in our community, the group of people engaged in this practice has grown and there is now an active group that gets together regularly to provide mutual support. We have also had the good fortune to have the support of Lama Eric Triebelhorn.

Please take some time to reflect on these opportunities to plan your year of joy and growth in wisdom and compassion with the support of a reliable, caring Dharma community. Any and all efforts toward the Dharma are certain to positively affect you, your loved ones, this world and all those in it.

The five lay vows—often referred to as "precepts"—form the foundation of ethical behavior in Buddhism. The practice of ethics complements formal meditation and is especially suited for lay practitioners in their daily life. By behaving ethically, we use our tendency toward habitual behavior to create positive results in our lives. The five precepts are usually described as commitments to abstain from killing, lying, stealing, sexual misconduct, and intoxication, but they can also be invitations to think how actions of body, speech, and mind can be guided to support wholesome, compassionate engagement with the world.

new dimensions of the practice with guided meditations and fuller explanations.

We are very pleased that Lama Eric Triebelhorn will guide us in a week of meditation practice (details coming soon!). KCC Refuge Ceremony 2016

Every year, KCC's New Years Retreat ends with a Refuge Ceremony. This year, five people chose to take refuge. Others renewed their vows or sat in support, filling the room with joy. Several of those who took refuge recently reflected on this experience.

Brooke Huffman began attending KCC in 2001. She is one of the twelve founding members of the Young Adult Group, and says that KCC has grown to be a significant part of her life over these past eight or nine years. "More recently I've been wanting to let the dharma take up more space in my life," she says, but she wasn't sure if taking refuge would be "appropriate." Since she doesn't "officially identify as Buddhist," she asked Lama Michael about it. "He encouraged me to take refuge and explained that it more marks my stepping onto the path than proclaiming any sort of identity or allegiance. He also posited, 'why not?'."

Usha Noble was listening that Sunday to Lama Michael's response, and this helped her to make the decision to take refuge. "It had been percolating within me for a year, and the time felt ripe and natural," Usha shares. "I was thankful for Brooke's question, 'Who should take refuge?"

"Lama Michael answered with the story of the boat, among other things," she recalls: When you come to a body of water and you need to cross it, and there is

a boat, use it. But once across and walking by foot on land, don't continue to carry the boat. Put it down and move on, unattached, he said.

"Yes," says Usha. "This is my boat, and I am intrigued by its contents and the people in it." She recalls that Lama Michael also suggests using a tried and true set of instructions—a path. "It doesn't make sense to try to make it all up on your own," says Usha. "People have accomplished the dharma. They've done it, and there are crumbs left to help us find our way."

"Just knowing that every day people I know and people I don't know are wishing me well, when you say, 'for the benefit of all beings'—that I'm included in this, and I include you in this—I find very uplifting and beautiful," she says. "The effect since taking refuge is really nothing different than before. My journey didn't begin Jan. 1, 2016. It began a very long time ago. I humbly call myself a Buddhist now. I feel more committed to the teachers and the sangha."

Brooke says she appreciates ceremony and symbolism. "It felt good to mark my stepping onto the path. I'm sure it is a ceremony I will never forget. In other ways, it felt like nothing had changed for me personally but that now perhaps others in the sangha see me a little differently and reach out to say hello more."

For Brooke, taking refuge coincided with an intention to carve out more space in her life for the dharma. "I've been sitting at home a lot more, but I would not credit the effect of this to taking refuge. I would say taking refuge and sitting in mindfulness more often are both effects of the ultimate cause which is that I set an intention."

Usha recalls words spoken by Oliver Wilken, a longtime KCC member who now lives in Gig Harbor, Washington. "It felt almost like nothing, but looking back on it now he sees how it has vastly changed the course of his life. If you can picture walking along in your life, and then just pivoting a fraction to the right or left; after 20 years of walking you find yourself in a very different place."

Sunday Streaming



But there's more to know about KCC's streaming opportunities.

First, you can participate in the Q and A while streaming. As you see in the photograph, there is a very small "menu" icon to the right of the live-stream screen. Open the drop-down menu and find an equally tiny "chat" option. When

that is open, you can type in your question and send it. The streamer will ask the question on your behalf, and you can hear the answer.



And more—perhaps you can't attend or stream on a particular Sunday, but you would like to participate on your own at a later date. Go to this same link at any time, and on the right are the recordings from the last several months. You can open whichever one you like.

Another way to use this opportunity is to go back and listen again to a teaching you might have found particularly valuable, or go to a date that you missed but heard from others had an illuminating discussion. We hope soon to begin streaming Sunday evening practice and Q and A.

OUR MALAS—Your KCC Dharma Store carries beautiful malas that open the heart and celebrate the spirit. The word "mala" means garland or necklace in Sanskrit. The traditional long mala of 108 beads is used for prayer or as a sacred necklace, and is often wrapped around the wrist. Our artists use select natural gemstone materials, the sturdiest elastic bead cord, and most have a Guru bead. The Guru bead, along with the smaller beads, symbolize respectively the teacher and the teacher's entourage.

Your mala becomes a daily reminder of your true nature.



SACRED ART like Sanje's calendars, the malas, silk bags, and statues found in our store can become reminders of the dharma every time you gaze upon them. They can serve a great purpose in your practice and, when reminded, it is a moment for connecting with the Buddha, the Dharma, and the Sangha.

Bluebird Conservation at Ser Chö Ösel Ling

When KCC purchased the SCOL land, it inherited the care of around 100 western **bluebird** boxes that were put up by prior owners. The boxes are part of a regional conservation effort to restore the bluebird population impacted by forestry and



agriculture. Bickleton, a nearby town east of Goldendale, calls itself the Bluebird Capital of the World.

Since the land was first purchased, KCC members have volunteered their time to clean the boxes. Dora DeCoursey and Adele Hilsen oversaw this effort for many years. Most of the boxes that came with the property were rustic handmade

They were placed mainly on oak trees, following recommendations to face south or east and be placed high enough to keep ground predators away but not too high to be a challenge for young birds learning to fly.

I got involved in this effort about six years ago, inspired by the sight of the birds while walking the land during a Mahamudra retreat. The following year, I began a project to locate and map all the bird boxes. They are scattered in clusters all over the property. We also had ambitious goals to track and record what we found in each box at the end of the nesting season or into the winter when we went around to clean the boxes so they would be free of bacteria, germs, parasites and wasps for the next nesting season. But after a few years of tracking, I stopped recording the contents, given how laborious the task was.



Over the years, we have found nests made of twigs, some of grass, some of moss. Some had wasp nests inside and a few had unhatched eggs. A number have been chewed up by rodents trying to make a bigger hole for their own use. I even found a small flying squirrel sleeping in one. The tracking evidence showed that bluebirds were using some of the nests. The most common areas for bluebirds are the edges of meadows. Many of the bluebirds use boxes around the barn and pond area.

The biggest chore is repairing or replacing broken boxes. Every year, the weather and critters take their toll. Ones beyond repair are replaced with new boxes. We found a bird box maker in Bickleton and have procured close to twenty new ones over the years. Eventually, we will replace all of the older boxes. With the retirement of our box maker, SCOL staffer, Abby Cummings, has offered to make boxes, possibly as part of a Children's program being planned by Adele Hilsen.

It takes about two full days for one person working diligently all day to clean and repair most of the boxes. There is a lot of walking over rough, uneven, often muddy or snowy terrain. The boxes are not always near a trail. I have enjoyed doing it as a kind of personal retreat, communing with the land. I know others, Adele and Dora in particular, have spent time on this work. We would like to know of others who have participated, and new people who might like to help out. This is a lower priority than the fire protection work underway, but it does need to be done once a year.

The work can be stretched over time, over a number of weeks or weekends. The ideal time is late fall or early winter. But even late winter is possible. In any case, the boxes must be cleaned by no later than early March when the male birds begin coming north looking for nest sites. Serious nest building begins in May after the females arrive and the cycle begins anew.

It seems to get us on the right track for difficult discussions.

The other day, I was sweeping the floor in the kitchen at KCC. I was feeling pretty grumpy when I remembered this prayer. I noticed as I said it, a shift occurred in my mind as I worked. It had to do with the concept Lama Michael talks about frequently—interdependence. As I recited the prayer, I felt more connected not only to what I was doing, but to why I was doing it; the simple act of sweeping became service to others, to KCC, Dharma practice. I understood it as an opportunity to be grateful to have the chance to serve and to help the Dharma grow in Portland.

Living at the KCC Center, I see so many volunteers quietly come and go throughout the week: Cynthia and Pat in the basement office; Rhonda, Susan G. and Adele in the yard, Steven putting up fire alarms, donated by the Red Cross; Julie H. going out to SCOL to help; Linda L, Diane and John Cusak setting up the bookstore displays, Bonnie McLean coming by to work on Dharma texts; Peter Wood working on the computers; Diane picking up worn cushions to repair, Phuntsok, cleaning the center day after day; Don stopping by to repair a leaking faucet; the KCC Board, Program Committee and other groups meeting regularly to keep KCC healthy and happy, Sally Mead tirelessly assisting Lama Michael, all the omzes who set up and lead the practices, the streamers who make them available to so many, Jeff and Sally volunteering to teach about ethics, Mary Woods leading the Childrens' program, Linda Grove heading up the Harmony Committee and organizing the Winter Retreat. And there are so many others constantly and reliably working behind the scenes here and at SCOL. Writing this brings happiness to the mind and heart! And I hope that reading it inspires you too.

Offering like this engages one in the Six Paramitas. It is generosity and can lead to patience and increased joyous effort. Then, we can dedicate it all, sending that positive potential we have created out to turn the world around us toward more peace and happiness.

During that period, we must try to do something good, something useful with our lives. If you contribute to other peoples' happiness, you will find the true goal, the true meaning of life."

A New Kind of Fundraiser

There is so much value in what KCC offers to the Dharma community. It is beyond words really... from a beautiful array of study groups, day-long teachings, long retreats (seven days)... and even longer retreats (three

years), to personal interviews and the amazing body of people who make up our ever-growing sangha.

Naturally, our focal point is the Dharma. But we are also a nonprofit organization and, when it comes to fundraising events and outreach, it is hard to know how to extend our value to a wider audience. To that end, KCC is going to try something different this summer.

To kick off this new effort, KCC is hosting a summer painting series out at its beautiful retreat land, Ser Chö Ösel Ling (SCOL). This series will bring the remarkable talents of three Portland artists—Kat Sowa, Jef Gunn, and Phillis Trowbridge—to SCOL. Each will lead a day or two of painting instruction on the land (far from the cloister where our Three Year Retreatants are in practice).



Each artist is known for her or his personal representation of en plein air painting. This is a French term created in the mid-19th century, meaning "open (in full) air", in which a painter reproduces the actual visual conditions seen at the time of painting in an outdoor environment.

Starting off the series in June, Kat Sowa will lead a day-long class on Saturday, June 18th. Kat finds that working with all levels of painters makes for a much richer class, so the class is open to everyone. "I am enthusiastic to lead painters through this process and share this joy with anyone willing to pick up the brush," she says. Kat spends her time on her farm on Sauvie Island, where she farms, paints what is around her, and holds en plein air workshops. "The sense of adventure that comes with en plein air painting, reminds me that I'm not in control of anything... but possibly my gear and my brush." You can see more of Kat's landscapes here:

Winter Retreat 2016

It is wonderful to have the support of others' practice. I found it extremely productive to have extended, continuous practice time without the distraction of everyday life, to have time to memorize what I've "been meaning to" memorize, to have time to read what I've "been meaning to" read. To borrow Ken McLeod's words, I transitioned from "questing" to "resting" in my practice. (Please see comments from other retreatants below.)

I hold deep gratitude for those who conceived the Winter Retreat long ago and for those whose heads and hearts provided the impetus to continue the tradition. I encourage those who have never been on the KCC Winter Personal Retreat to consider doing so next year... you could even put it on your calendar now!





For those with no painting background, Jef Gunn will guide you through a day of painting the sacred high desert retreat landscape. With a balance of humor, broad knowledge, and helpful insight, Jef is able to draw from each student her or his own natural way to paint. He is also fond of applying historical examples in his teaching, especially those of the Impressionist and Modern periods.

Featured Thankga: Vajradhara


Vajradhara (Sanskrit), Dorje Chang (Tibetan), is the first figure in the Kagyu Lineage. Tilopa, the first human in the lineage, received direct teachings from Vajradhara on the qualities of emptiness, and passed them on to the rest of the lineage.

Vajradhara is said to be a "primordial" or "Adi Buddha" and embodies the qualities of emptiness, thus his blue body color. He has essentially the same attributes as the Nyingma deity, Kuntuzangpo, except that Kuntuzangpo is always

shown naked without either Buddha robes or the Sambhogakaya clothing of the Vajradhara.

In addition, Vajradhara is said to be the source of the Buddhas of the five Wisdom Buddha families: Amitabha (red), Ratnasambhava (yellow), Akshobya (blue), Ratnasambhava (green), and Vairocana (white).

This painting was created by Bhutanese painter, Thinley, whom I first met at Rumtek, Sikkim, in 1971. Thinley now lives in Kathmandu, where he continues to paint. This thangka is in my personal collection and will be given to KCC eventually.
